College Admission Timeline:

Frequently Asked Questions

• What is THEI?

- THEI is a non-profit organization that funds and coordinates programming inside prisons in Tennessee. Our mission is to provide access to on-site degree-bearing higher education for individuals in Tennessee prisons; to support our students in leading meaningful lives in and outside prison; to prepare our students for successful re-entry; and to help our students become contributing members of our communities.
- The program began in 2012 at Charles Bass Correctional Complex with 25 students. In 2014, the program expanded to Turney Center Industrial Complex, then to Northwest Correctional Complex in 2017, and finally our newest location, Morgan County Correctional Complex in 2019.
- THEI students at Turney Center are enrolled as official students at Nashville State Community College (NSCC). THEI students at NWCX are enrolled as official students at Dyersburg State Community College (DSCC). THEI students at MCCX are enrolled as official students at Roane State Community College (RSCC).
- Is THEI part of Nashville State Community College?
 - THEI is not part of NSCC or part of TDOC. We are an independent organization that works in partnership with NSCC and TCIX. THEI is made up of Executive Director Molly Lasagna, Academic Coordinator Ka-Rhonda Porter, and Student Support & Re-entry Services Director Rachel Zolensky.
- What does this program offer me?
 - The program offers an Associate's Degree in Business Administration or Political Science. This degree requires 60 credit hours of study and takes between three and four years to complete.
 - Being a part of the THEI community also gives students the opportunity to receive other services,
 such as career counseling, re-entry support, and transition onto a college campus upon release.
 - THEI student reports: The program offers much to those individuals dedicated to the idea of change. There are many men who have never been told that their lives have value and that they can contribute to society. This program can first and foremost provide that self-awareness
 - THEI student reports: The primary reward of college is of course a degree, but the hidden treasure that the students discover is how to access and analyze information. The student becomes a critical thinker, and this can change the path of life for anyone willing to exert the effort.
- Who will my professors be?
 - All professors for the THEI college program are official professors at our partnering college. At TCIX, all professors come from NSCC.
- How much does college cost?
 - The cost for students is \$25 per semester, which can be paid in one, two or four installments.
 That money goes toward tuition. The remainder of tuition is covered by THEI as are all textbooks and school supplies.
- What is expected of me while I am in college?
 - College students are expected to conduct themselves with academic integrity, persistence and initiative. Students must have clean disciplinary records (no A write-ups in the last six months).
 Attendance in class is mandatory. In order to maintain good standing in the program, a student must keep his grade point average above 3.0. College is hard work! Take it seriously and you will set yourself up for success.
 - THEI student reports: For a brief period of time each day you attend class, or study. During this time you are a student, not an inmate. You are a member of a community of men and/or women that are trying to improve their lives and the lives of their families. You matter. Act like you want to belong to that group. Generally speaking, you get treated exactly the way you treat others.
- How much time per week should I expect to spend on college?
 - 2-3 Classes meeting once a week each, in the evenings, for three hours. In addition to required
 class time, students are expected to complete all homework and reading assignments, and to do
 what it takes to turn in all work on time. Students can expect to spend an average of six hours
 per week on each class.



- THEI student reports: As much as possible; the more you put in the more you get out.
- What are the important dates for me to know?
 - In order to be **considered** for admission 2020, you must:
 - Turn in your completed application by April 1st.
 - Turn in your essay and supporting documents when you turn in your completed application.
 - Successfully gain admission into the College Prep program
 - Complete the College Prep program
 - Take & Pass the Reading Accuplacer test (week of August 3rd).
 - If you are accepted, orientation will take place the week of August 17th.
 - Classes begin the week of August 24th.
- How many students are currently enrolled?
 - There are approximately 58 students in the program at Turney Center across two cohorts. There
 are currently 35 students at Northwest and 25 students at the Morgan County location with 25
 more being accepted in the Fall.
- How many students will be accepted this year?
 - We anticipate 25 qualified students will be accepted at Turney Center in August. 25 students will be selected to begin at Morgan County in August, 2020. This will be MCCX Cohort 2.
- I've taken some college in the past. What happens to those credits?
 - Speak with Ka-Rhonda or Chris about this! We will work to find your transcripts from your prior colleges and have those credits transferred to NSCC.
- What is College Prep?
 - The College Prep program will meet one evening a week, and will cover everything from academic tutoring, to test-taking, to study skills, to learning about what is expected of a THEI college student. You must participate in College Prep in order to be considered for a spot in Fall 2020 classes.
 - After this ten-week preparatory course, you will take the college entrance exam, Accuplacer, in Reading/Writing. Attendance is mandatory at every college prep session!
- Is admission into the college program guaranteed?
 - No. Although we would love to accept all applicants, we must limit the amount of qualified
 applicants due to the availability of space and financial reasons. Persistence and perseverance
 are key traits of a college student. If you are not successful the first time, you are able to reapply.
