DEAR FRIENDS,

2020 was a historic year, one in which many of our community members faced isolation, loss, fear, frustration, and instability. It was also a year when individuals banded together to grow movements for social change, to support neighbors and loved ones, to fight and heal for the future we are building together. This report reflects the complexity faced by our community throughout 2020 while also reminding us of the reasons the work of building communities of learning and growth is more critical than ever.

For organizations and institutions offering higher education in prisons, the responses to Covid-19 varied widely. In 2020, UBB was fortunate to be able to continue with adapted programs throughout much of the year. Some highlights include that we were able to print and distribute enrichment course packets, develop and launch two rounds of our new Community Read Project program, offer up to three credit-bearing classes to all of our active students underway in degree programs, and cheer on 9 UBB college graduates as they completed their degrees!

While our enrollment and graduation numbers are fewer than we've seen in years past, we are proud of the resilience of our program. We are grateful to everyone who contributed to the work of creatively keeping programs running. And above all, we have immense awe and praise for the resilience, flexibility, and commitment of our student community.

In this report you'll find, UBB's story of 2020 along with some portraits of the years prior so you can fully understand how we envision the scale of our work and how we have navigated this ongoing storm. We hope that when you look through this report, you'll feel the sense of inspiration and care that we feel in this work. Thank you for supporting what we do!

HISTORY

The value of higher education in prison has long been overlooked and underestimated, and government support of college-in-prison programs has varied over time. For instance, in 1991, there were 772 college-in-prison programs in 1,287 correctional facilities across the country. In 1994, the Violence Crime Control & Law Enforcement Act banned all prisoners from receiving federal financial aid. Washington State ended all funding that same year. By 1997, the number of college-in-prison programs had dropped to 8.

University Beyond Bars was founded in 2003 by a group of volunteers and incarcerated individuals in the Black Prisoners' Caucus at the Washington State Reformatory. Today, in one typical quarter, we enroll roughly 300 students in credit-bearing and enrichment courses. Nearly 70% are first-time college students, nearly half are people of color, and the majority will be released in 5 years or less. All classes are provided at no cost to students and are open to all prisoners regardless of identity, sentence type, sentence length, and more.

PROGRESS



In 2017, UBB was selected by the U.S. Department of Education as one of 67 programs across the country to participate in Second Chance Pell, an Experimental Sites Initiative pilot project that temporarily restored financial aid for eligible incarcerated students.

At the end of 2020, with bipartisan support, Congress voted to permanently restore Pell grants for incarcerated students. This reversal of the 1994 crime bill is a huge victory for criminal justice advocates and will open up new pathways for incarcerated individuals to access education.

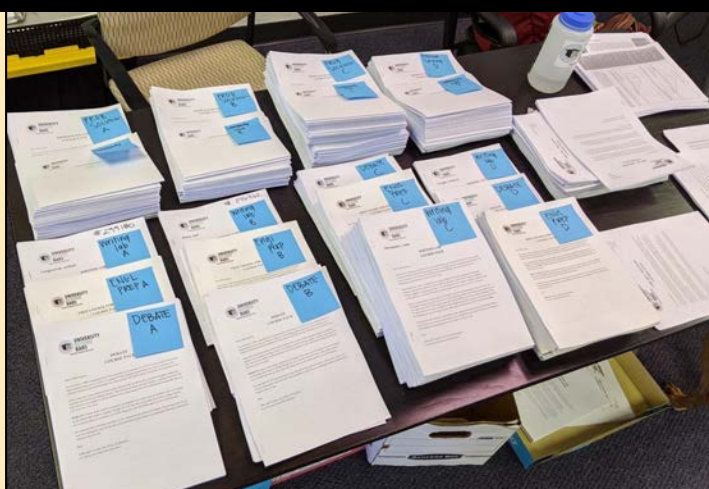
As prison education programs of all different models expand across the country, UBB will remain committed to creating the most complete college experience possible inside prison. We believe in robust, in-person instruction where students directly engage with and learn from one another. The value of higher education in prison is not just in the college degree or the number of credits, but in the culture of community and self-empowerment.

ENRICHMENT CLASSES DURING COVID-19

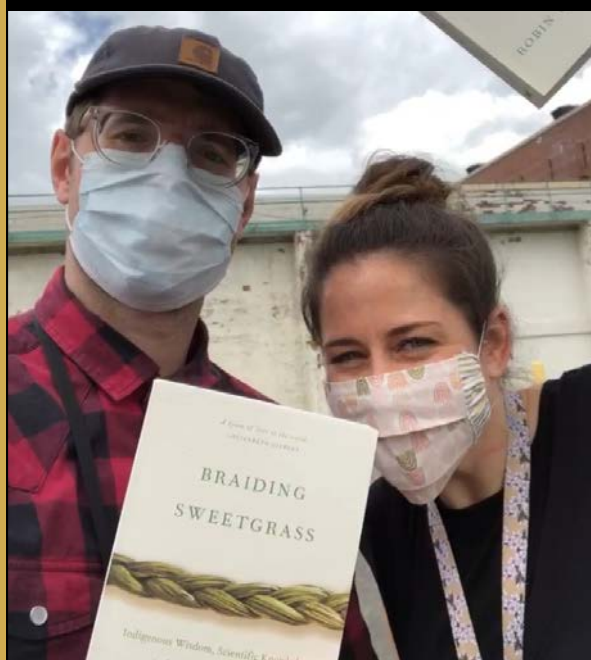
While volunteers were not permitted into WSR for most of 2020, UBB staff got creative and designed the following enrichment learning opportunities for our students

200+ COURSE PACKS for PRINT-BASED LEARNING

One of our print-based learning courses during COVID-19 was centered on self-care. UBB partnered with Collective Justice to develop a self-care course pack that promoted positive psychology. The course pack was made available to the entire WSR population

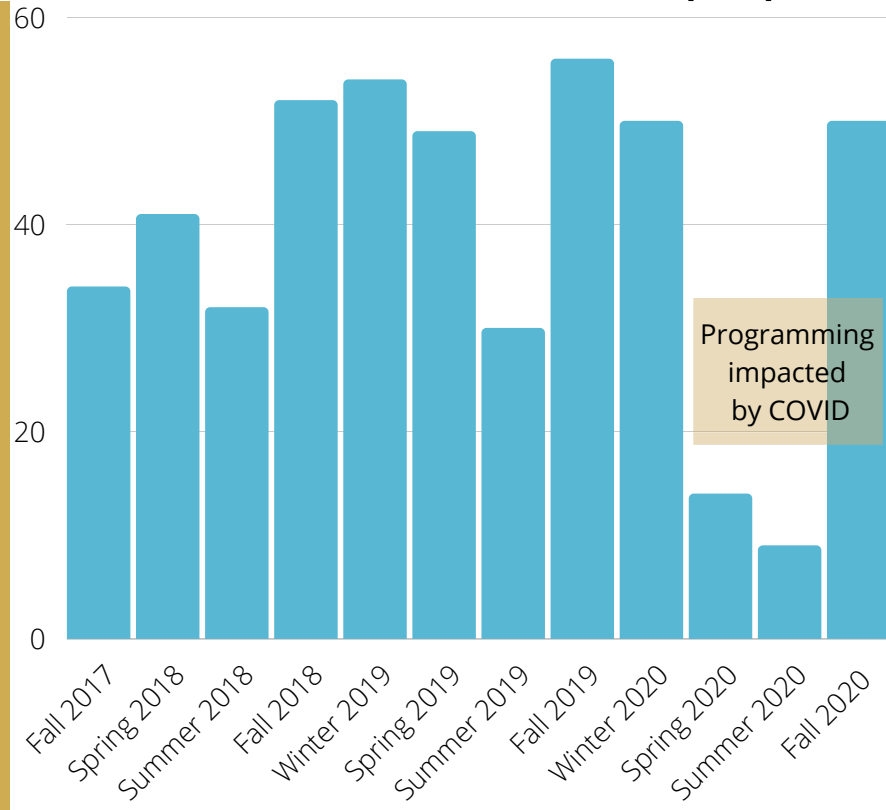

Number of individual students enrolled per quarter

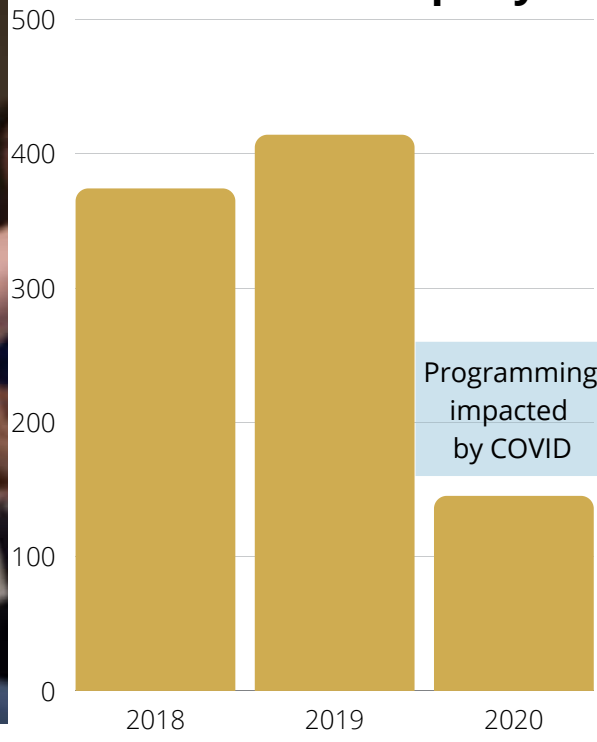

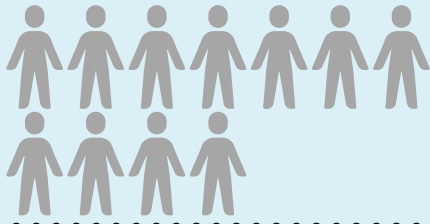
Total enrollments per year

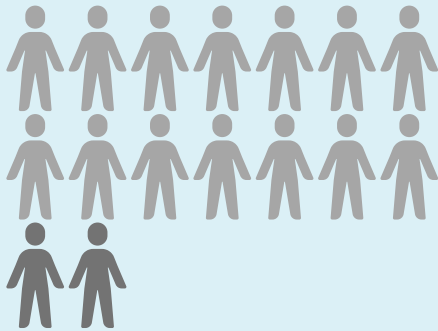

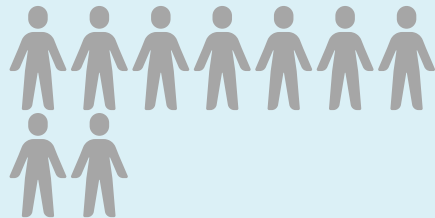

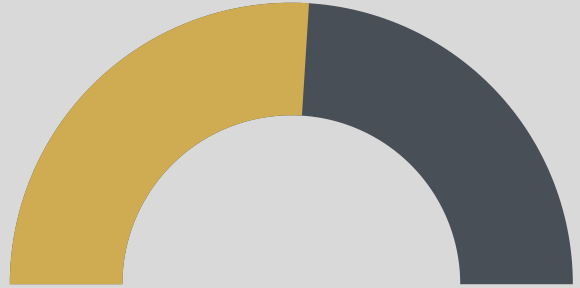

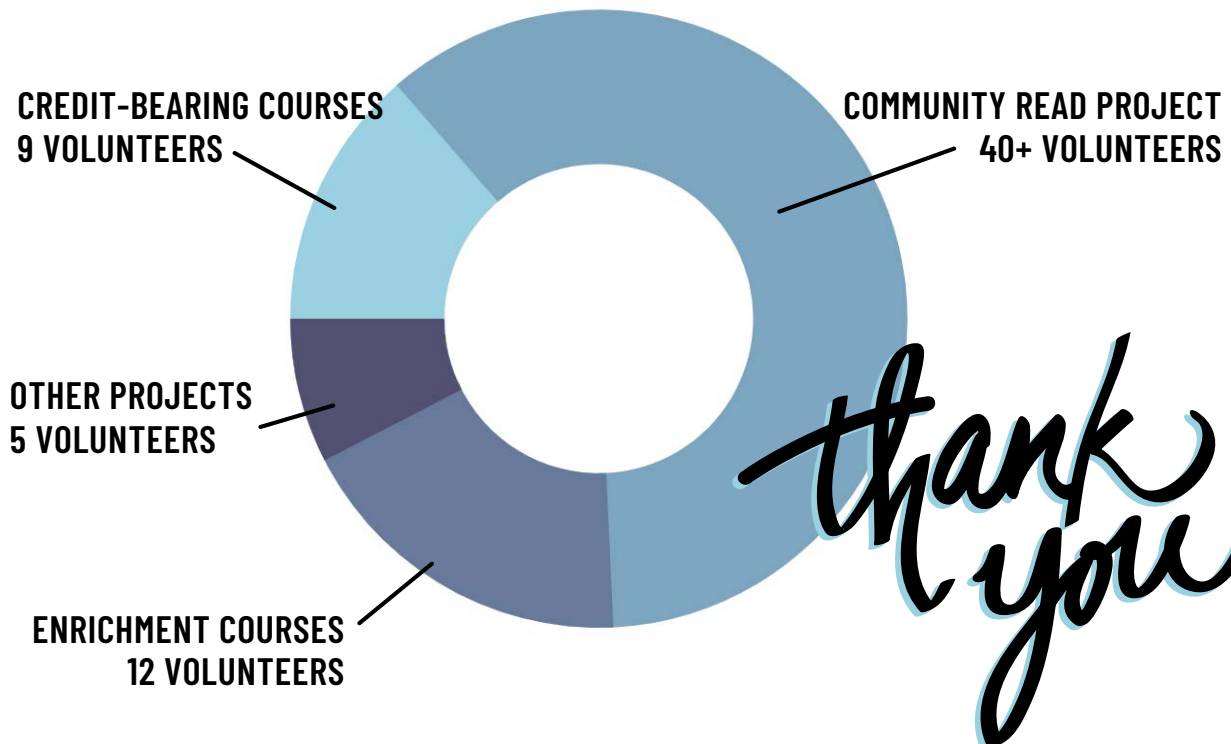


UBB graduates have an average GPA of 3.7

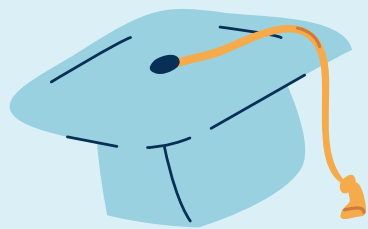

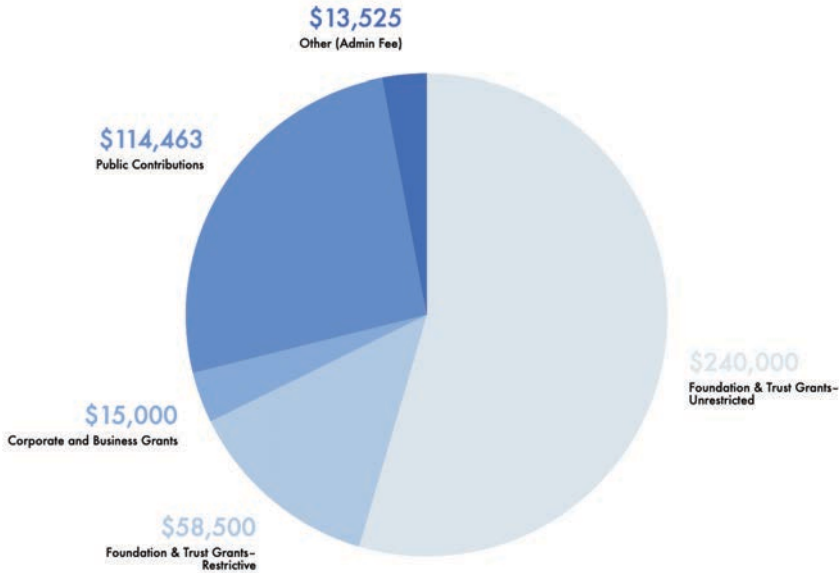

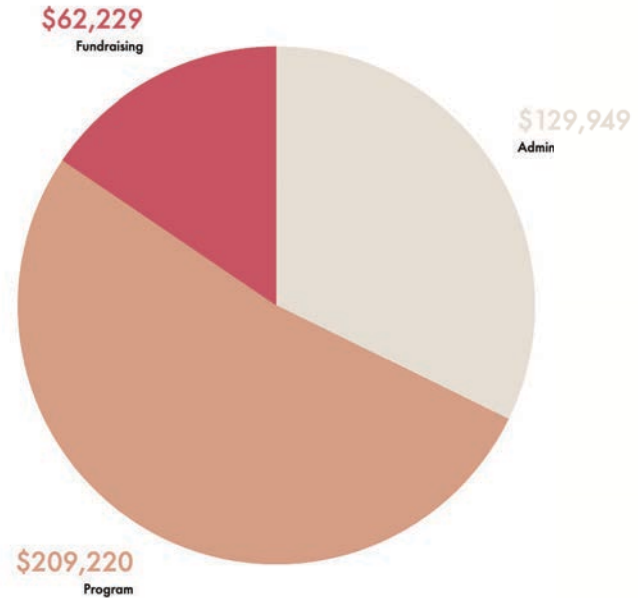
